

Transportation Services

Call 'N' Ride Transportation Program - This service provides a discount door-to-door taxicab transportation service for senior citizens, age 60 and over. Seniors may use the coupons for any transportation purpose. The amount of the discount is based on a sliding fee scale. To learn about this program, call (202) 724-5626.

Caregiver's Respite, Escort Services for Transportation (CREST)

A joint partnership between Home Care Partners and the District of Columbia that assists residents who need help using transportation to travel to non-urgent health care appointments. Phone: (202) 638-0736

Medical Transportation Management (MTM)

MTM provides non-emergency transportation to eligible Medicaid beneficiaries that have appointments with Medicaid providers. To use this service, Medicaid beneficiaries must contact MTM 72 hours (3 days) before their scheduled appointment to arrange transportation service request. You can call them at (866) 796-0601 or (202) 263-4640.

MetroAccess

Many people who live with a disability can get around the Washington DC metropolitan area with the help of Metro Access. Metro Access provides door-to door service. You must apply and call Metro Access seven days in advance to make a reservation. The costs for each MetroAccess trip begins at \$2.50 unless you have a free trip card from MetroAccess. To apply, call (301) 562-5360 (TTY users call (301) 588-7535).

Washington Handicapped Elderly Transportation Services (WHETS)

DCOA/ADRC provides basic transportation for seniors who cannot access traditional transportation during the week day. Arrangements are made to transport elderly persons to essential medical appointments, dialysis sessions, appointments with public benefits agencies (Medicaid, Medicare, Food Stamps, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Social Security, and banking institutions, etc).
